kin cancers can start out looking like a pimple or a red, scaly patch that does not heal or may even increase in size. Any skin lesion that does not heal after six weeks could be a sign that the lesion is a skin cancer.

"While skin cancers can certainly metastasize to other organs and cause death, they also destroy local tissue, and this can be disfiguring and potentially life altering. The key to cancer treatment is early diagnosis and treatment," says Dr. John R. Adams, a dermatologist with Advanced Dermatology and Skin Cancer Center, based in Manhattan, Kansas.

technique used to remove skin cancers completely while preserving healthy, cancer-free tissue. "With Mohs surgery, the patient ends up with the smallest loss of skin possible and the highest cure rate possible. This is why Mohs surgery is the gold standard for the treatment of skin cancer. It's

a win-win—the highest cure rate with the smallest scar," Dr. Adams explains.

Why Mohs Matters

When Wisconsin physician Frederick Mohs, MD, first developed the technique that bears his name in the 1930s, he was met with much ridicule by the medical community. But as decades passed, Dr. Mohs' results changed minds. Today, Mohs surgery is the gold standard for the removal of skin cancers, particularly those in areas such as the nose, ears, lips, eyelids, and hands, in which tissue sparing is of vital importance.

The advantages of the procedure are numerous. "Mohs surgery is done with local anesthesia, so general anesthesia is not necessary. Because general anesthesia is not necessary, procedures can be performed in the office. This means no extra facility or anesthesia fees. Therefore, Mohs surgery not only has the highest cure rate and preserves the maximum amount of healthy, noncancerous tissue; it also saves money."

Dr. Adams estimates there are fewer than 10 Mohs surgeons in Kansas. Advanced Dermatology and Skin Cancer Center provides its patients with access to the most experienced specialist in the state. Dr. Adams is now expanding access to his practice to even more residents of Kansas with Advanced Dermatology's new offices

in Ottawa, Emporia, and Salina.
