

hen you look at someone, you're most likely to first notice their eyes and for good reason: Eyes tell a lot about a person. They can show if someone's tired, what kind of mood someone is in, or even what that person is thinking.

That's why a growing number of men and women are turning to minimally invasive plastic surgery to enhance the areas around their eyes and forehead, opening up and brightening their faces.

"It really is an amazing change," says Dr. Evan Black, an ophthalmologist and oculoplastic surgeon. "The eyes and the area surrounding them are the first places people look. They form people's first perception of you."

Dr. Black and his colleagues, Drs. Nesi, Gladstone, Nesi-Eloff, Schlachter, Beaulieu, and Kahana, at Consultants in Ophthalmic and Facial Plastic Surgery, which has nine locations throughout the Detroit area, have performed tens of thousands of surgeries—not only improving patients' appearances with forehead lifts or by removing under-eye bags, but also helping people improve their vision by correcting sagging upper eyelids. Most procedures take just 30 to 60 minutes.

"My goal is not to give patients an entirely new look but to make them look like younger, happier versions of themselves," Dr. Black says. "Before a procedure, patients sometimes tell us their family and friends always ask them what's wrong or ask what they're upset about. After the procedure, patients say they interact with people in a more positive way. People who have always been happy now look that way."

## **Center of Excellence**

The physicians at Consultants in Ophthalmic and Facial Plastic Surgery have undergone extensive training to achieve their subspecialty expertise in understanding the relationship between eyelids and the eyes themselves. Dr. Black, for example, received his medical school education at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill School of Medicine.
