Know the Signs of a Stroke

B.E. F.A.S.T. is a helpful way to notice the signs of a stroke. If you notice these signs, call 911 right away.




Balance: Is the person experiencing loss of balance, dizziness?



Eyes: Is the person complaining of blurred vision?







Arm Weakness: Is one arm weak or numb? If you ask the person to raise their arms and one side drifts down, this could be a sign of a stroke.



Speech Difficulty: Is the person's speech slurred or uneven? Ask them to repeat a phrase, like "I like chocolate" to help you determine if they could be having a stroke



Time to call 9-1-1: Any one of these symptoms could be a sign of a stroke. Call for help immediately.
